## KAMPERS PLANS AHEAD

BERT KAMPERS has completed plans for the operation of the small dining room situated off the main cafeteria. It will, in effect, be the principal training area for students in the Hotel/Restaurant Management program and will be open to faculty, staff and their guests Monday through Friday, except when it is being used as a classroom. Reservations will be accepted for a special lunch (French style) on Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday, starting in the third week in September. People making use of this room on other occasions are reminded that they are expected to clear away their own dishes. Hotel/Restaurant Management students will serve and clear on those days when the special lunches are being served.

## CAFETERIA CLOSED SEPTEMBER 1

THERE will be no cafeteria service on Wednesday, September 1. On this occasion the facilities will be reserved to cater for the reception and luncheon following the official dedication of the new Tamagawa University agricultural site in Cedar. Upwards of 300 guests are expected to attend, with Cook Training students responsible for the preparation of all foods.

## TAMAGAWA PARTY HERE SUNDAY

THE TAMAGAWA UNIVERSITY group, made up of 81 students and 5 chaperones, will arrive at the College on Sunday at 3:00 p.m. and will leave for Vancouver at 10:00 a.m. on Friday, September 3. During their stay in Nanaimo, many of the students will be living in the homes of faculty and staff, with others being hosted by members of the community.

## JOBS FOR STUDENTS

FROM FINANCIAL AID experts Chuck Van VanAntwerp and Iris Thomson comes a reminder that students interested in (on or off-campus) employment should pick up employment applications at the Financial Aid Office. During the course of the year there are a number of part-time jobs available to students. These jobs are posted on the job opportunity bulletin board near the entrance to the cafeteria. It is important to register with the Financial Aid Office, giving complete list of skills and experience. Any work available should be funnelled through the Financial Aid Office for posting. Confirmation of employment would be appreciated.

## HOUSING & TRAVEL SUBSIDIES

HOUSING and Travel Subsidies - Full-time (12 semester hours) in-region students from school districts #65 (Cowichan), #66 (Lake Cowichan), #69 (Qualicum), or #41 (Powell River) are eligible for Housing or Travel subsidies. Full-time in-region students, whose permanent address is within the boundaries of the above school districts, are eligible for a \$50.00 per month housing subsidy if they take up temporary quarters in Nanaimo. Those full-time in-region students who commute daily to Nanaimo from permanent housing within the boundaries of one of the above school districts are eligible for a \$15.00 per month travel subsidy. Forms to qualify for these subsidies are available at the Financial Aid Office. Faculty are reminded that the Financial Aid staff can only be sure that students are attending classes - thus being eligible - when monthly signature sheets are signed by instructors.

## GOARD COMMISSION COMING

THE GOARD Commission, which is visiting regional colleges to investigate the state of career training programs in B. C., will be on campus September 1. Members of the commission come from the Departments of Labor and Education, as well as from college faculties and councils. They will be looking into BCIT, vocational and technical programs to establish whether or not they are meeting existing community needs. After touring the new campus, the Commission will be available to meet faculty, and to receive written briefs, preferably short, and oral presentations.

## NO SMOKING

NO SMOKING signs have now been posted in a number of strategic locations throughout the College, and it is hoped that these will be observed. Smoking will not be permitted in the theatre, now nearing completion, nor in the choral recital hall. This rule also applies to all classrooms, labs, seminar rooms and the LRC except for designated areas. Co-operation of all

members of the College Community is requested in adhering to this policy. Questions regarding certain areas should be referred to Dr. Opgaard.

### TOW-AWAY STARTS

NO PARKING signs have been placed along College Way and elsewhere, and a number of cars have already been removed, at the owner's expense. Parking could be a very real problem once the new term starts and the decision to blacktop the park immediately below the Cafeteria should relieve some of the pressure. Observance of the NO PARKING regulations is essential to allow Regional Transit buses, which now make regular stops on College Way, to keep to their hourly schedule.
